came to be incorporated in interpretations of the archaeological record. In a similar way, the impact of such ideologies as nationalism and patriotism can be traced, both in terms of the indirect impact these had on the archaeology, and in terms of the way that the archaeology itself was used to further the political ends of such ideologies.

Gerald Killan will present his biographical work on the 19th century Canadian archaeologist David Boyle. Dr. William Noble will speak on Emerson's contributions to Canadian archaeology and Barnet Richling will discuss Artic archaeology during the 1920s and 1930s at the Museum of Civilization. These subject headings may only be searched in Keyword Subject Heading (KSH) or Keyword (KW) indices. Since July 1,1986, only LC Subject Headings have been used and they may be searched in Subject (SU), Keyword Subject Heading (KSH), or Keyword (KW) indices.

Note: To search by Tozzer call number use the Call Number—Other (CO) index.

SERIAL TITLES AND JOURNAL ARTICLES: Journal articles are not included in HOLLIS but only in the card catalog (up to July 1983) and Anthropological Literature (1979-). The holdings for all serial titles for which Tozzer had a standing order at any time since 1986 are included in HOLLIS.

GETTING INTO HOLLIS: You can access HOLLIS through the Internet, or by dial-up access from a microcomputer with a modern. For information on dial-up access call the number in the HELP section below. HOLLIS is accessible via Telnet to HOLLIS.HARVARD.EDU

FROM THE OPENING MENU: Choose HOLLIS from the opening menu. Once you are in HOLLIS, a second menu screen will appear. The databases you may search in HOLLIS are Harvard Union Catalog (HU), Older Widener (OW), and Library Guide (LG). AD of Tozzer's bibliographic records in electronic format are in HU. A description of Tozzer Library (or any other Harvard library) can be accessed in the LG database.

EXITING HOLLIS: Depending upon software and hardware considerations, the command for quitting HOLLIS varies. Call one of the numbers below to find out what command to use to rid yourself of HOLLIS. Or, simply wait 10 minutes without pressing ENTER or RETURN and HOLLIS will rid itself of you.
