Each deals with different elements of the study of antiquarianism, which has recently become a more popular focus in the historiography of archaeology. We thank the Director of the Institute of Archaeology, Professor Stephen Shennan for his generous support of the conference.

As usual I warmly encourage all readers and subscribers to contribute to the forthcoming editions of our Bulletin, and to do their best to build our subscriber base. Subscriptions continue to grow, but we need to continue to find new subscribers and new contributors.
